Population

Young adults ages 25 to 34 comprise the largest cohort of the residents in San Juan County, equal to 16,918 residents, or approximately 13.5 percent of the population. Adults, 35 to 44 years, are second with 16,191 residents. White (55.5%) and American Indian (42.0%) comprises the largest segments of population in San Juan County.

Employment

New job creation has met or exceeded the amount needed to match population growth. Industry specific data shows significant employment construction, mining, manufacturing, retail wholesale trade, transportation and warehousing, health care and social assistance. professional and technical services, and accommodation and food service.

Job Market

The per capita income is \$22,067, and continues to rise. In 2010, income was \$19,265, which points to an increase in more higher paying jobs. Top wage jobs include mining, oil and gas extraction, utilities, construction, manufacturing, truck transportation, pipeline transportation, telecommunications, and insurance carriers.

The Four Corners Regional Airport serves as the primary anchor offering two runways, hangar space, aircraft maintenance, and on-demand charter service to and from nearly any destination in the U.S. A recent runway extension to service larger commercial jets is paving the way for the resumption in commercial air service.

200-acres of land north of the airfield provides ample space to grow business operations.

U.S. Hwy 64

Connecting San Juan County with Oklahoma and Arizona, US Hwy 64 runs 429 miles east to west, providing a critical corridor for trucking and warehousing and 48-hour access to major markets across the western U.S.



Residential Housing Development

Corridors including Pinon Hill Blvd and 30th Street provide direct connections to entertainment and shopping, yielding an ideal location for new housing development to meet demand for single-family detached housing.

Located within this census tract is one of the largest farming operations in the United States - Navajo Agricultural Products Industry. Along with a strong defense manufacturing and tourism sector, the area has been the recipient of significant investments.

Navajo Agricultural Products Industry NAPI operates three Navajo Pride processing facilities: Bean Plant, Potato Fresh Pack and Flour Mill. 72,000 acres of farmland provides capacity to support entrepreneurial endeavors.



Chaco Culture National Historic Park Chaco Canyon is a concentration of fifteen major pueblo complexes that remained the largest buildings ever built in North America until the 19th century.



Raytheon Dine Facility 125,000 square-foot complex is used by the world's largest missle manufacturer to support 12 missle programs such as the Tomahawk cruise missle, Javelin weapon system, and Advanced Medium-Range Air-to-Air Missile.


